**1. CALL TO ORDER & ROLL CALL**

PSEAC Chair called the meeting to order at 6:30pm

**Roll Call/In attendance:**

**PRESENT:** Chair Victoria Rizzo, Vice-Chair Woodrow Terrell, Carol Allen, Shelby Staffenson, Twilla Harrington, Mary Howell, Sherilee Winters

**ABSENT:** Wade Bakley

**GUESTS:** Jason Gates, Troutdale resident; Paul Wilcox, Troutdale resident; and Sandy Glantz, City Councilor.

**2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

The committee and attending public recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

**3. PUBLIC COMMENT**

Jason Gates, Troutdale resident, discussed a potential hazard with the flashing yellow left turn lights going East on Stark Street and turning left (north) onto 257<sup>th</sup>. The line of sight is poor and dangerous for vehicles as well as pedestrians crossing the street while the yellow light is flashing. An easy fix would be to take away the flashing yellow light.

Ray Young, City Manager, stated Multnomah County controls that intersection. That is one of 2 places that he has suggested the Committee may want to consider recommending red light cameras at that intersection.

**4. PRESENTATION ON CITY'S EMERGENCY PLAN**

Ray Young, City Manager, stated that the Emergency Operation Plan (EOP) is the City document that lays out how the City will operate during emergencies and who is in charge of doing what. The City's current EOP is dated in 2010 and is very outdated and needs to be reevaluated. Through the work of Troutdale Councilor Glantz and Fairview Councilor Lawton, they were able to get a \$200,000 for the 3 cities to update the EOP. He is currently looking for a consultant to assist in preparing an updated EOP however he is having a hard time obtaining at least 3 bids needed for the procurement process. The only bid received is from Stantec Consulting with a bid around \$120,000 to do the EOP for each of the 3 cities including a tabletop exercise and the additional monies would be used for education of the citizens. The

procurement needs to get done and then we can begin working on it. It's about a 5 to 6 month process to come up with a plan for the 3 cities.

Committee questions:

- Twilla Harrington stated that in her link of work they do yearly hazard vulnerability assessments and wanted to know if there are standards to do those at a frequency as a city?
  - Ray Young responded when it comes to a natural hazard mitigation plan, he believed they had to be done every 5 years.
- Woodrow Terrell stated his background touches on this topic and he would love to assist in any way. Prior to moving here he was the CFO to his local Federal Executive Board (FEB) which is a board that coordinates emergency action which is the national structure of disaster recovery.
- Carol Allen stated years ago she was involved in a CERT (Citizens Emergency Response Team), do we have that here?
  - Ray Young replied no we don't. It has been discussed but a group of citizens that want to take charge of it is needed. The most important thing citizens can do is to know your neighbors. In an emergency, you may only have them to help you. He thought this would be a great thing to bring up to Gresham Fire Chief Lewis when he is at the next meeting.
- Woodrow Terrell asked Ray if he could add a Scout Explorer fire post to what he discusses with Chief Lewis?
  - Ray Young replied ok.

Ray Young gave an update on what the Public Safety Services Delivery Working Group has been working on:

- Law Enforcement Services:
  - Working with a consultant to create a budgetary scenario to recreate the Troutdale Police Department and what it would cost to pay for it on an annual basis.
  - Taking our current contract with the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and make some changes (increasing the Chief position from .66 FTE to a 1 FTE position, increase the .5 FTE Beach Deputy to a 1 FTE 2<sup>nd</sup> Community Resource Deputy, and giving the Chief more involvement in supervising the CRD and our Code Compliance Officer). , and request a bid proposal for what the next 10 year contract would look like.
- Fire Services:
  - Working with consultants to create a budgetary scenario for us to create our own Fire Department, a 3 cities Fire Department, or to join a Fire District.
  - Mike McKeel with Fire District 10 will come to the next meeting to discuss what a Fire District is and he will be speak at the next Fire District Board meeting.

Ray Young discussed the current battle going on in Multnomah County regarding ambulances. He suggested that the Committee review the March 12<sup>th</sup> Council packet online to get all of the information that you'll need to know about the dispute that is going on. The primary problem is that Multnomah County is one of the few jurisdictions in all of the United States that requires two Paramedics per ambulance. Most areas require one Paramedic and one EMT. The problem is that it is hard to find and hire Paramedics, so they are understaffed by 35%. The

result is that ambulances don't show up until very late. The Council is going to be asked to pass a resolution calling on the County Commission Chair to immediately allow for a pilot program with AMR to staff some of the ambulances with one Paramedic and one EMT and see how it goes.

Ray Young let the Committee know that Councilor White has asked for the City Council to discuss the potential narrowing of 257<sup>th</sup> through the County's safety upgrades on Tuesday night.

## **5. APPROVE FEBRUARY 1, 2024 MEETING MINUTES**

**MOTION:** Carol Allen moved to approve the February 1<sup>st</sup> minutes. Twilla Harrington seconded.

Motion passed unanimously.

## **6. REVIEW OF MONTHLY LAW ENFORCEMENT REPORTS FROM FEBRUARY**

- Captain Asboe discussed the Law Enforcement Reports
- Items of Note:
  - Increase in calls for services from last month as well as the previous years average. The largest increases were to traffic stops and theft calls.
  - Increase in stolen vehicles reported with some were in similar areas and Deputy Bohrer will be working to review those reports for patterns or possible suspects.
  - There were 19 detective cases assigned out of Troutdale.
- Committee Questions:
  - Sherilee Winters: Calls for serve log, #3 shows response time of 12 minutes and 55 seconds to an assault with a priority 2 call, it seems like most of the other calls have a faster response. Do you have any indication on why it would take that long?
    - Captain Asboe: No but it's very likely that our deputies could have been tied up on another call that required multiple deputies at a different location. We have mutual aid agreements and if our deputies are tied up on calls, priority calls will still get responded to. Those mutual aid officers may come for a different location and it may take longer for them to arrive than it would normally.
  - Twilla Harrington: At the end of summer we had the person(s) who were knocking down signs around Troutdale. She is noticing more signs down. Did that person(s) get caught?
    - Captain Asboe: That case is still open. He had not gotten any reports of signs knocked down for a long time and is equating that to school starting but is not sure. If you are aware of any signs down, please report them.

## **7. DISCUSSION OF 257TH IMPROVEMENT PROJECT**

Key Items Discussed:

- Victoria Rizzo: The Committee that Ray said this topic would be on the next Council agenda and members are able to attend and make public comment. She also mentioned

a report that Multnomah County shared that said roads with freight truck traffic should not have lanes narrowed and they are not following that.

- Shelby Staffenson: She thought the group was concerned enough that the Committee should write something formally expressing their concerns about lane narrowing. She asked if the Committee should make a formal statement to present to the City Council? Mary agreed. Twilla supports a letter that can be signed but on the fence on this topic. Carol thinks they should.
- Twilla Harrington: The County came to the Citizens Advisory Committee a couple of times about 2 years ago and presented back then.

**MOTION:** Carol Allen moved that the Committee write a letter to present at Public Comment to City Council on Tuesday night regarding our concerns of the corridor safety improvements on 257<sup>th</sup>. Seconded by Shelby Staffenson.

**VOTE:** Carol Allen – Yes; Woodrow Terrell – No; Shelby Staffenson – Yes; Victoria Rizzo – Yes; Twilla Harrington – No; Mary Howell – Yes; and Sherilee Winters – Yes.

**Motion passed 5-2.**

- Concerns to put in the letter included:
  - The documentation contradicts the narrowing of lanes in a freight corridor
  - Narrowing of lanes impedes emergency vehicles
  - The crosswalks don't take a holistic approach
  - No data collected on actual bike usage/traffic study
- Carol Allen, Victoria Rizzo, Shelby Staffenson, and Woodrow Terrell will be attending the Council meeting and Mary Howell is also going to try to be there.

## **8. UPDATE ON SAFETY SURVEY**

**MOTION:** Carol Allen moved to table the conversation on the safety survey until the April 4<sup>th</sup> meeting. Seconded by Woodrow Terrell.

## Discussion Points:

- Should the City enact a Fee Schedule for Fire and Life Safety Inspections
- If so, what should be the amount of the fees.
- Should the City update its reference to the Oregon Fire Code to the most recent iteration
- Should the City ban backyard burning of debris and manmade materials
- Would any such ban improve air quality and safety

## Background:

The City is currently being provided fire protection services under an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) by the City of Gresham. The fire IGA was a "joint" contract which included services to Wood Village and Fairview also. In addition to fire and emergency services, the Gresham Fire Department (GFD) also provides fire code enforcement, fire related plan review and fire inspection services. The GFD desires

consistent fees, codes, and enforcement across all 4 cities. To that end, the GFD is requesting that the City update its code regarding the current Oregon Fire Code, backyard burning and a fee schedule for inspection services.

### Backyard Burning

Currently the City follows the dictates of the Oregon Fire Code and the Oregon DEQ “burn days” to govern when a person may burn materials on their property. DEQ already prohibits backyard burning west of 181<sup>st</sup> because of increased concerns around smoke inhalation and health, fire risk concerns; and because we have additional options for yard debris disposal. We currently have no specific code section that restricts backyard burning beyond that. The GFD would like the City to adopt a backyard burn ban in accordance with Ex A.

Both Fairview and Gresham have enacted a similar backyard burn ban. The Wood Village City Council has discussed it and seem in favor of it. They have asked staff to do some community outreach before they consider the ordinance change. They anticipate having it on their agenda this summer for a First Reading. For Spring burning they are still allowing days as designated by DEQ, but anticipate that by the fall season they will have enacted an ordinance similar to Fairview and Gresham.

GFD is requesting that we put the backyard burn restrictions in place to improve air quality and to support a healthy environment. It also reduces the risk of “wildfire” due to burns that get out of hand. The impact of backyard burning on adjacent neighbors has only intensified as our community becomes denser due to increasing infill, smaller lot sizes, and the upcoming middle housing.

### Fire Fee Schedule

When the City Council adopted code section, “15.12.090 - Fire safety inspection program” in 2007 it contained this phrase multiple times, “... pay a fee ... established by council resolution”. However, the City Council never passed a resolution setting a fee schedule pursuant to the Code. GFD is requesting that we adopt a fee schedule consistent with the fee schedule in Gresham, Fairview and Wood Village. That fee schedule is attached as Ex. B.

The fees paid by the businesses for a fire inspection would be subtracted from the money Troutdale pays GFD under the Fire Service IGA. Each July 1 beginning on July 1, 2024, the fees set out in Exhibit B should be indexed by 5%. The fees set out in Exhibits B should then be automatically adjusted each July 1 thereafter, continuing in 2025 and 2026.

### Code Chapter 15.12- Fire and Life Safety Code Update

The City’s Municipal Code includes chapter 15.12 regarding “Fire and Life Safety”, which mostly refers to the State’s Fire Code. The state Fire Marshal tends to update the state code every three to five years. The City last updated its Fire and Life Safety Code in 2007, and specifically references as our code authority the “Oregon Fire Code (OFC), 2007 edition”. We locked our code into the 2007 version, and we have not

updated it since. The language, proposed by GFD stops our code from being locked into what is, and would continue to be, an older version of the code. The intent, with the new language, is to make our code adaptable to the state's code, which would remove the need to revise the City's code every time there was an update to the State's code.

Additionally, GFD recently reviewed the City's code and found other areas to update to keep it consistent with the State's code. Most of the revisions were around affirmative statements about following the state's code as amended and code reference updates. The revisions do not alter how the City performs this work, but rather updates the code to follow how the City and its partners currently enforce the code. A tracked change version of these code amendments is attached as Ex. C.

### Conclusion

After the presentation by Chief Durham, City staff would like direction from Council on what code changes to bring back to the Council for a first and second reading.



Proposed Backyard Burn Ban

New TMC Chapter 15.12.100, of the Fire and Life Safety Code

15.12.100 - Unlawful Burning

A. No person may:

1. Burn yard debris or any type of material on any single or multiple family property within the City of Troutdale.
  2. Burn at any time any manmade material; rubber; plastic; garbage; construction materials; petroleum-based materials; or any other product for which burning is prohibited by the Department of Environmental Quality.
  3. Conduct any type of burning during a declared fire season.
  4. Set on fire, or cause to be set on fire, any grass, grain, stubble, or other material being or growing on land within the city.
  5. Intentionally or negligently allow fire to escape from the person's own land, or land of which the person is in possession or control.
  6. Accidentally set any fire on the person's own land or the land of another and allow it to escape from control without extinguishing it or using every reasonable effort to do so.
  6. Know of a fire burning on the person's own land, or land of which the person is in possession or control and fail or neglect to make every reasonable effort to extinguish it, regardless of whether or not the person is responsible for the starting or the existence of the fire.
- B. Violators are subject to penalties pursuant to chapter 1.04.095 of this code, and 15.12.10 (C) of this chapter.









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




### Avg. Hours Spent in Troutdale per Day by Shift Q4 2023 - D60 Units Only - Based on GPS Data
